Over the coming months, we will be having a growing focus upon general knowledge around the school. This will be more than just that body of knowledge built up in and around the classrooms. It will specifically focus upon current affairs, local, national and international.

My assemblies in particular will pick up on news events relevant to the children's understanding and tolerance. During these assemblies we will consider the issues, feelings, emotions and relevance to their classroom learning. For example, this week I was due to think about the budget, Ukraine, Richard III and the birth of a baby gorilla.

But why on earth do this?

Well, here are but a few reasons.

Firstly, these topics give the children something to talk about. It is less about being able to quote knowledge, facts and figures and more about developing an opinion on the world and being able to express it. Current affairs provide us with a shared cultural reference point that we can all express an idea about as we will all have had some experience of it on a Monday morning.

Secondly, current affairs can make more relevant what we are learning in school. So for example, the budget allows us to consider maths in a very contextual and real way. We can talk to children about addition and subtraction, percentages, large numbers and see problem solving and decision making in meaningful situations. Equally we can think about Russians getting their name from the Viking settlers' ability to row extremely quickly, *Russ*, as well as how we could settle disagreements in a reasonable fashion.

Finally, discussing current affairs allows us to cultivate a curiosity and inquisitiveness about the world around us. Talking about it gives it an importance and children have a model for going out and finding out what is going on around them and what relevance that has upon their lives, helping them in turn to develop empathy, charity and appreciation.

Given these important factors in a child's development and their success at school and life, I would very much encourage you to talk about the news with your child. A great starting point is CBBC's [Newsround](#), which at the point of writing boasts as it's headlines such stories as an enormous cave, great for descriptive writing, IT advancements, for conversations about e-safety, and giant chicken dinosaurs, great for...well, just great!!!
